Conference Speakers

Peter Block is a widely known consultant, author, and activist in efforts to create a more compassionate, inclusive and sustainable economy in American communities. His work is associated with that of John McKnight, founder of the asset-based community development movement. With Walter Brueggemann has helped found and inspire Cincinnati's Economics of Compassion Initiative (ECI).

Thomas Breidenthal, Bishop of Southern Ohio, studied at Oxford University as an Episcopal Church Foundation Fellow, where he received the Ph.D. in Theology. From 1992 through 2001, he was the John Henry Hobart Professor of Christian Ethics and Moral Theology at the General Theological Seminary. For the following five years, he was the Dean of Religious Life and of the Chapel at Princeton University. Breidenthal is the author of two books (*Christian Households: The Sanctification of Nearness* and *Sacred Unions*) and numerous articles. He serves on the boards of Kenyon College, Bexley-Seabury Seminary, and Cincinnati Children's Hospital, and has been involved throughout his ministry in civic engagement and ecumenical and interfaith dialogue. Bishop Briedenthal and his spouse, Margaret Garner Breidenthal have two adult daughters.

Walter Brueggemann is a noted Old Testament Scholar and Theologian. He has written over 100 books and is emeritus professor at Columbia Theological Seminary. His books include The Prophetic Imagination and The Message of the Psalms. An accomplished public speaker, he has worked with Peter Block to crate Cincinnati's Economics of Compassion Institute which promotes community based, sustainable, and inclusive ways to build a better economy.

Charles Wynder, Jr. is Episcopal Church Missioner for Social Justice and Advocacy Engagement. He is a member of the church wide Justice and Advocacy staff based in Washington, D.C. He is responsible for engaging Episcopalians in building, resourcing, and empowering advocacy movements and networks for social justice at a local and community level. His portfolio includes a strong focus on racial justice and related issues.
